Sister Loretta Spotila is a native of Cleveland, Ohio and has been a member of the Sisters of Charity of St. Augustine for over 50 years. Sister Loretta has been a Registered Nurse for over 45 years and received a Masters Degree in Nursing from the Catholic University of America, Washington, DC, in 1973. She founded Interfaith Wellness Ministry as a non-profit organization 1977.

After receiving her Masters Degree, she worked as a Clinical Nurse Specialist in several Cleveland, Ohio hospitals. In this role she provided advanced clinical nursing care to patients with chronic illnesses such as diabetes and heart disease and established several hospital-based patient education programs. In addition, she has served in Nursing Administration and hospital-wide Quality Management and Performance Improvement. Sister Loretta was instrumental in several Ohio hospitals receiving renewal of Accreditation from the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO).

During her vast clinical and administrative experiences, Sister Loretta always was active in the community where she lived. She has served on several Boards of Trustees for area hospitals and community agencies, as instructor for the Nursing Continuing Education Program of Cleveland State University, and as a Red Cross Nurse Volunteer. Along with her great love for nursing, Sister Loretta enjoys all types of music and has played both piano and organ for many years. She likes to garden and has a favorite Lavender herb plant which she has cultivated since the 1980s. Her favorite colors are those of Autumn, which also happens to be her favorite season of the year!
